### Listening and Appraising

Pupils will study 12 set pieces throughout the 2 years as well as general listening pieces. The set works are based on the 4 Areas of Study and cover a wide range of music from the 1500's to the Modern day, and music from different cultures. Pupils are tested on their knowledge of these pieces in the exam. -2 listening papers in June of Year 12 = 35%.
